NOTICE OF PUBLIC HEARING

Pursuant to the provisions of M.G.L. c. 118E and in accordance with M.G.L. c. 30A, the Executive Office of Health and Human Services (EOHHS) will hold a public hearing on Thursday, September 12, 2019, at 10:00 a.m., in the First Floor Conference Room, 100 Hancock Street, Quincy, MA relative to the adoption of:

101 CMR 329.00: Psychological Testing, Treatment, and Related Services

and the repeal of:

114.3 CMR 29.00: Psychological Services

These actions are being taken in order to comply with c. 224 of the Acts of 2012, which transferred authority for this regulation from the Division of Health Care Finance and Policy in M.G.L. c. 118G to the Executive Office of Health and Human Services (EOHHS) in M.G.L. c. 118E. 101 CMR 329.00 replaces 114.3 CMR 29.00 as the regulation governing the rates of payment used by state governmental units for psychological testing, treatment, and related services provided by eligible psychologists, and contains amendments as well.

The proposed regulation contains changes and updates from the current rates established for psychological services under 114.3 CMR 29.00. The proposed rates comply with the new Medicare coding requirements and establish rates for all psychological services under 101 CMR 329.00 at 75% of the corresponding Massachusetts Medicare rates. The proposed regulation also includes updates to: (i) incorporate technical changes related to the transfer of rate-setting authority; (ii) remove references to a standard hourly rate, as this will no longer apply; (iii) revise the general rate provision related to individual consideration; (iv) remove all obsolete services; (v) assign appropriate Current Procedural Terminology (CPT) codes for previously non-coded therapy and diagnostic services; (vi) remove from the fee schedule the testing timeframes for component tests of the psychological testing service; and (vii) remove the separate fee schedule for psychological testing of the hearing impaired, as the proposed rates will apply to any eligible population of publicly aided individuals, including individuals who are deaf or hard of hearing.

EOHHS is proposing this regulation and amendments to ensure that payment rates are consistent with efficiency, economy, and quality of care, and to satisfy the requirements of M.G.L. 118E, sections 13C and 13D. EOHHS anticipates that annual aggregate MassHealth expenditures will increase by approximately \$4,300 (4.4%) as a result of these amendments. There is no fiscal impact on cities and towns. The proposed regulation and amendments do not impose new costs on small businesses; the impact on small business providers will vary based on the volume of services provided.



The proposed regulation is planned to go into effect no sooner than January 1, 2020.

Individuals who notify EOHHS of their intent to testify at the hearing will be afforded an earlier opportunity to speak. Speakers may notify EOHHS of their intention to testify at the hearing by registering online at www.mass.gov/service-details/executive-office-of-health-and-human-services-public-hearings. Individuals may also submit written testimony by emailing ehs-regulations@state.ma.us. Please submit electronic testimony as an attached Word document or as text within the body of the email with the name of the regulation in the subject line. All submissions must include the sender's full name, mailing address, and organization or affiliation, if any. Written testimony must be submitted by 5:00 p.m. on Thursday, September 12, 2019. EOHHS specifically invites comments as to how the amendments may affect beneficiary access to care.
