



I have received your March 16, 2010 email request for an advisory opinion. See G.L. c. 3, § 41 (2008 ed.). Specifically, you inquired whether a non-profit organization that co-hosts a "thank you" celebration for legislative officials who sponsored and passed a particular bill should report the expense on its disclosure statement.

In addition to expenses related to lobbying efforts, employers of executive and/or legislative agents must also disclose certain other expenses. The statute provides in relevant part that such employers must also report:

...[a]ll expenditures for or on behalf of the statewide constitutional officers, officers and employees of such offices, members of the general court, officers and employees of the general court, officers and employees of the executive branch and officers and employees of an authority, and the total amount thereof incurred or paid separately by such employer during the reporting period...

G.L. c. 3, § 47 (2008 ed.) (Emphasis added).

Accordingly, despite the fact that there may be no lobbying occurring, as the legislation has already passed in this instance, the event and the expenses in connection therewith must be reported pursuant to G.L. c. 3, § 47, since members of the general

court will attend and partake in the event. To the extent that pays any part of the event, the expense should be reported on its disclosure statement for the relevant reporting period.
