NOTICE OF PUBLIC HEARING

Pursuant to the authority of M.G.L. c. 118E and in accordance with M.G.L. c. 30A, a remote public hearing will be held on Monday, January 23, 2023, at 10 a.m. relative to the emergency adoption of:

101 CMR 314.00: Rates for Dental Services

101 CMR 314.00 governs payment rates paid by MassHealth and other governmental purchasers for dental services. In January 2022, as described in Transmittal Letter DEN-112, the Executive Office of Health and Human Services (EOHHS) implemented a rural add-on payment for eligible MassHealth-participating dental providers who render covered dental services to MassHealth members at their practice address within the five counties stated below to receive an encounter fee for dates of services on or after January 1, 2022. Eligible dental providers may bill for the encounter fee using code D9450 at the rate established in 101 CMR 314.00. EOHHS determined that the following five counties are eligible for the rural add-on payment based on the following criteria:

- Counties that are >25% rural based on U.S. Census data (Berkshire, Dukes, Franklin, and Hampshire), or
- Counties that the Health Resources and Services Administration (HRSA) has designated as High Needs Geographic Health Professional Shortage Areas (HPSA) (Barnstable)

The following actions are being taken pursuant to the requirements of M.G.L. c. 118E § 13C and 13D. Effective January 1, 2023, EOHHS will adopt the following proposed amendments on an emergency basis with rates effective for dates of service on and after January 1, 2023. The proposed amendments to 101 CMR 314.00 increase the current rate of \$19 to \$31 for code D9450 by applying retrospective cost adjustment factor (CAF) of 65.04% using a base period of quarter one of calendar year 2004 and a two-year prospective rate period of quarter one of calendar year 2023 through quarter four of calendar year 2024. All other rates are proposed to remain at their current levels. It is estimated that the aggregated annual MassHealth expenditures will increase by \$2.8 million. There is no fiscal impact on cities and towns. The amendments are not anticipated to impose new costs on small businesses, and any impact on small business provided.

EOHHS is making these changes, subject to federal approval, to ensure that payments are reasonable and adequate to meet the costs that must be incurred by efficiently and economically operated facilities, and to ensure that payment rates are consistent with efficiency, economy and quality of care.
