Pursuant to the authority of M.G.L. c. 118E and in accordance with M.G.L. c. 30A, a remote public hearing will be held on January 27, 2023, at 12:00 p.m. (noon) relative to the adoption of:

101 CMR 359.00: Rates for Home and Community-Based Services Waivers

Summary of Proposed Regulation

The Executive Office of Health and Human Services is proposing amendments to 101 CMR 359.00: Rates for Home and Community-Based Services Waivers. The proposed amendments contain rates effective July 1, 2023.

Regulation 101 CMR 359.00 contains rates for services provided to participants of the Acquired Brain Injury (ABI) and Moving Forward Plan (MFP) Waivers. The ABI and MFP Waivers are Home and Community Based Services (HCBS) Waiver programs authorized under section 1915(c) of the Social Security Act. The ABI and MFP Waivers help transition eligible members from nursing facilities and chronic disease and rehabilitation (CDR) hospital settings to community-based care. The proposed amendments to 101 CMR 359.00 include the following:

- (1) **Updated Rate References**: Existing references to rates established in other Executive Office of Health and Human Services (EOHHS) regulations are being adjusted for the following service: Individual Support and Community Habilitation. The proposed updates reference a higher level of service to ensure the services are accessible to participants with more complex medical conditions.
- (2) Rates Based on Analysis: Services for which rates are established in 101 CMR 359.00 are proposed to be updated based on application of 4.93% cost adjustment factor (Assisted Living Services, Day Services, Independent Living Supports, Orientation and Mobility Services, and Prevocational Services) or by analysis based on data for comparable services purchased under the statefunded Home Care Program (Adult Companion, Chore, Homemaker, Personal Care, and Supportive Home Care Aide).
- (3) Rates for New Services: Home Delivered Meals (at \$10 per meal), Laundry (based on comparable data from the Executive Office of Elder Affairs), and Assistive Technology (Devices at individual consideration and Evaluation and Training referencing 101 CMR 423.00).
- (4) **Expansion of Existing Services**: Updating the services available through the ABI Waivers to align with the services available through the MFP Waivers.

The total estimated fiscal impact of the proposed amendments, including the rate updates effective for dates of service on or after July 1, 2023, is \$10.9 million for MassHealth. The proposed amended regulation contains rates effective for dates of service on or after 07/01/2023. There is no fiscal impact on cities and towns.
