NOTICE OF PUBLIC HEARING

Pursuant to the authority of M.G.L. c. 6A, section 16 and in accordance with M.G.L. c. 30A, the Division of Medical Assistance (the Division) will hold a remote public hearing on Monday, January 30, 2023, at the times listed below relative to the adoption of the following regulations.

- 1. 1:00 p.m.: 130 CMR 501.000: MassHealth: General Policies. The proposed amendments to 130 CMR 501.000 update the Basic Benefit Level (BBL) definition which governs which health insurance plans are eligible for MassHealth Premium Assistance payments. Proposed changes also include adjusting how the existing deductible and out of pocket maximum thresholds are set, and clarifying the existing restriction on the use of Health Savings Accounts and similar instruments to reduce the deductible threshold.
- 2. 1:30 p.m.: 130 CMR 505.000: MassHealth: Coverage Types. The proposed amendments to 130 CMR 505.000 clarify the definition of 'young adult,' update the postpartum period to 12 months, and update the extended eligibility section to comply with MassHealth's interpretation of federal law. Proposed changes also remove references to the now-defunct Small Business Employee Premium Assistance program.
- 2. 2:00 p.m.: 130 CMR 506.000: MassHealth: Financial Requirements. The proposed amendments to 130 CMR 506.000 clarify the existing Premium Assistance overpayments process, introduce the new Premium Assistance overpayments hardship waiver process, and remove references to the now defunct Student Health Insurance Plan (SHIP) Premium Assistance and Small Business Employee Premium Assistance (SBEPA) programs throughout the chapter. Updates are also proposed to remove references to the now defunct Small Business Employee Premium Assistance (SBEPA) program.

The proposed regulations are planned to go into effect no sooner than May 2023. There is no fiscal impact on cities and towns.
