Notice of Public Hearings and Public Comment Period: 2023 Recreational Fishing Regulations for Black Sea Bass and Scup

Under the provisions of G.L. c. 30A and pursuant to the authority found at G.L. c. 130 §§ 17, the Division of Marine Fisheries (DMF) is taking public comment on recently enacted emergency regulations amending 322 CMR 6.00 to implement the 2023 recreational fishing limits for black sea bass and scup. These emergency regulations, which are described below, are designed to reduce recreational harvest by 10% in 2023 for each species, as necessary to meet coastwide mandates. Full text of the regulations may be found on DMF's website along with additional relevant background information.

Recreational Scup Limits (322 CMR 6.27). DMF is taking public comment on emergency regulations that: establish a January 1–April 30 closure for all anglers; increase the minimum size limit from 10" to 10.5" for vessel-based anglers (both private mode and for-hire mode); reduce the minimum size limit from 10" to 9.5" for shore-based anglers for environmental justice purposes; and reduce the May 1 – June 30 for-hire bonus season bag limit from 50-fish to 40-fish. The changes are described in the table below:

Recreational Black Sea Bass (322 CMR 6.28). DMF is taking public comment on emergency regulations that: (1) increase to the minimum size limit from 16" to 16.5"; and (2) adjust the open fishing season so that it continues to open on a Saturday and provide the longest season possible at the status quo bag limit. The changes are described in the table below:
